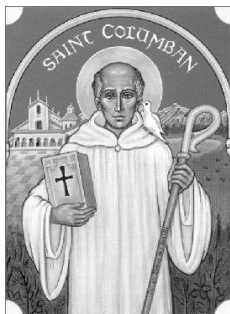

Academy for Parish Leadership in Baden-Baden March 5-7

Saint Columban's Mission has been invited to send representatives to the first European Institute of Christian Studies' Academy for Parish Leadership. The first of these yearly academies will be held in Baden-Baden March 5-7, and it is important that at least one – or even better two – of our congregation can attend the conference.

The Academy of Parish Leadership was formally launched at the Convention by Bishop Whalon and Felicity Handford, Chair EICS. The conferences are aimed particularly at members of the Vestries of the eight parishes and the Cathedral as well as the Bishop's Committees of the missions. The four events are designed to provide training for the vestries and other church leaders who have a particular interest in any of the four programs. The main speaker at the first conference will be the Rt. Rev Bishop Pierre Whalon. The EICS is covering all the cost of the board and lodging for three people from each of the parishes and two from the each of the missions. There will be some help towards travel costs. Ideally the people who should come should include wardens and treasurers/bookkeeper.

**Christmas Message from Presiding Bishop
Katharine Jefferts Schori**

December 7, 2009 - The mornings are dark, pitch black until after most of us have begun our days. The hints of dawn in the eastern sky, those streaks of rose and pink that promise more and brighter light, bring hope even in the dark mid-winter. Where do you look for that kind of hope borne on slim rays of light?

Jesus is already abroad, even in the darkness. The hungry one fed, the street people who have their feet cared for, the humble and honored guest at your dinner table -- each one offers a glimpse of that dawn, if you look closely enough.

What we have waited long for, ages and eons for, has been born among us. He comes among us quietly, almost stealthily, in an obscure barn, long ago. This child holds all our hope for light. This tiny frame seems too frail to bear our yearning. Yet the nations come streaming to this light even before he is weaned. The divine has come to dwell in our midst, and God's eternal promise of peace, restoration, and home is made flesh.

Where and how will you seek out this light of the world? In what other frail frames will light expunge darkness? The light grows with our own eager searching, light reaching out to light, divine reflection yearning for its source. May the light of Christ light your way in the darkness, may his light spread through nations besieged by war and hunger, may we continue to search out his light in the dark places of our own hearts.

Archbishop of Canterbury's World AIDS Day Message “A Space for Hope”

December 1, 2009 - The Archbishop of Canterbury, Dr Rowan Williams, has released his 2009 World Aids Day video, in which he speaks with the Revd Patricia Sawo, a church leader and mother from Kenya, about her experiences of living with HIV. The video highlights the plight of expectant mothers who are HIV positive and the support they need to prevent the transmission of HIV to their babies. Dr Williams and The Revd Sawo discuss both the problems that emerge through keeping silent on issues surrounding HIV and the importance of the Church's role in breaking this silence and providing support and leadership. As a faith leader and a mother herself living with HIV, The Revd Sawo gives the example of her own church: "My congregation knows about my status and people in my church know that this is a place where, if they come with HIV, they can be loved."

The Revd Sawo calls for the eradication of the stigma and denial associated with the condition: "The things we are silent about, the things we never talk about - they are the things that really affect us".

In the video the Archbishop says that the Church can: "Provide space for people to face themselves, to be themselves, and to cope with their future."

A message of hope runs throughout the video. The Archbishop says: "We know that the transmission from mother to child is something that can be dealt with. We need to encourage all our governments to keep up their commitment to making this medical help available, and to giving that hope, which we know is possible."

The Revd Sawo echoes this: "What makes me hopeful is the Church, and the love that a woman can receive in the Church. Hoping in faith that all things are possible, but at the same time making it a reality by having the space in the Church where women can grow to be themselves, and be able to face all kinds of life challenges." The video also highlights the role of men, of fathers, in supporting mothers to access support and vital services.

According to the United Nations, there are 2.1 million children (0-15 years) living with HIV. In 2008, 430,000 children were newly infected with HIV, 90% of them through mother-to-child transmission. In low and

middle income countries, only 45% of mothers living with HIV can access comprehensive services to help protect their babies from infection.

Patricia Sawo is the HIV Ambassador for Tearfund, a Christian relief and development agency, who co-produced the video.

Our Services

Our regular services in Karlsruhe are held, if not indicated as otherwise, on the 1st Sunday of the month at 11 a.m. in the chapel of *Luisenheim*; in the 1st quarter of 2010, i. e.:

January 6 (Wed.)— Christmas 2: Holy Eucharist (Rite I)

February 7 — Epiphany 5: Holy Eucharist (Rite I)

March 7 — Lent 3: Holy Eucharist (Rite I)

You reach *Luisenheim* by public transport using trams to *Schillerstraße* (nearest) or *Mühlburger Tor* (from *Hauptbahnhof*, the direct line is 6). From *Schillerstraße* walk on the north side of *Kaiserallee* in the direction of *Mühlburger Tor* and turn into *Kochstraße*. Enter the gate of No. 2-4 and turn to the building to your right, showing the inscription “Luisenheim” on the wall facing the street (and currently directly opposite a construction site). You find the chapel on the ground floor at the end of the long corridor, last door on the left side. From *Mühlburger Tor* cross *Kaiserallee* in northward direction (to the side of the red *Christuskirche*) at *Rathaus West*, and walk into *Südl. Hildapromenade*. After some steps, you reach the Old-Catholic Church of the Resurrection. The gate to *Luisenheim* (Kochstr. 2-4) is just opposite to the end of *Helmholtzstraße*, the street passing on the south side of the Old-Catholic church,

Letter of James 5:14), do let the Priest in Charge know as soon as possible.

The Old-Catholic Churches, which gained independence from papal jurisdiction in the course of time, and especially in the 19th century, are in full communion with the Anglican Churches. For a time we were their guests with our services, and we are most sincerely invited to their (German language) services (Holy Eucharist: Sunday at 10 a.m., Tuesday at 7.10 a.m., Thursday at 7 p.m.) in the *Auferstehungskirche* (see above p. 6) in summer, or in the parish house beside the church, in winter.
